Introduction

As a result of an unprecedented partnership between the Arizona and Utah Attorney General's Offices, a Safety Net Program has been established which represents coordinated efforts of human services agencies and law enforcement organizations and Arizona and Utah.

The Safety Net Program found its beginnings in the 2003 meeting between Arizona and Utah law enforcement and Attorneys General. Both the Arizona and Utah Attorney General determined that there exists in Colorado City and Hildale an intense need for not only increased law enforcement but also for improved access to social services and community resources. Since that time, representatives from law enforcement, state and local social service agencies, advocacy groups and members of the community have convened monthly meetings to discuss the special needs and concerns of those living in polygamous communities. Outreach and support to victims must address the barriers unique to the polygamous communities such as geographic isolation, historical disputes with government, transportation barriers, lack of access to victim services.

The goals of the program include opening communication, breaking down barriers and working together to ensure that those affected by polygamy have equal access to justice, safety and social services.



Services: Arizona Community Information and Referral (CIR) is a health and human services directory. The Information Helpline is available 24 hours a day, 365 days per year. The Web site provides state and federal government links, such as law enforcement agencies and county Web sites. There are also media links to helpful and relevant magazines and newspapers. Further resources that are offered include contact information for non-profit agencies and legal aid services. Additionally, community voice mail is offered which gives homeless individuals private phone numbers to help with job searches. The Community Network for Accessing Shelter (CONTACS) assists domestic violence victims with finding shelter in emergency situations. Arizona 211 directory services and Teen Link pre-recorded messages are also available. The Arizona Community Information and Referral Web site contains referral links to similar services in other states.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: The Web site is accessible to all states. There is no charge for calls made from within area codes 602, 520 and 928. Calls made from outside these area codes are toll calls. Services are available to residents of Mohave, Coconino, Navajo, Apache, Gila, Pinal, Maricopa, and La Paz Counties. Some services are offered statewide, including: referrals for free income tax assistance, summer activities, holiday assistance, and Flu/Pneumonia immunizations.

Services: Most services offered can be completed by telephone. Itinerate services are by appointment only. Call 928-753-6621. There are no office hours in Colorado City. The DES Child Care Administration (CCA) helps eligible families pay a portion of child care costs when parents or caretakers participate in DES eligible activities, such as employment. Eligibility requirements are different for each Child Care program. CCA contracts with small family child care homes, Department of Health Services (DHS) licensed child care centers and group homes and non-certified relative providers to provide child care services for eligible families. CCA provides funding to increase the availability and improve the quality of child care services. The office also certifies child care homes. The Web site includes a link to an on-line child care referrals.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Income criteria (up to 165% of US poverty guidelines). To be eligible, individuals must be employed or, if attending school, must be working 20 hours per week. If unable to care for children due to either physical or mental disabilities, some assistance may be possible. A doctor's statement explaining disabilities must be provided. Open to Arizona residents only.

Services: Child Protective Services is a part of Division of Children, Youth and Families within the Arizona State Department of Economic Security. When allegations of child abuse or neglect, exploitation or abandonment indicate the need, Arizona law requires Child Protective Services to conduct an investigation. The Child Protective Services program receives, screens and investigates allegations of child abuse and neglect, performs assessments of child safety, assesses the imminent risk of harm to the children, and evaluates conditions that support or refute the alleged abuse or neglect and need for emergency intervention. This program provides case management, parent aide and other in-home family support services. Additionally, out-of-home services to individuals or families are offered, as well as assistance to young adults in transition from adolescence to adulthood.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Services are available to Arizona residents only. However, residents of any jurisdiction may call in a complaint pertaining to residents of Arizona.

Services: The Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) provides services and programs to eligible individuals with developmental disabilities and their families by promoting and providing flexible, quality, and consumer-driven services and supports.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Open to Arizona residents who have a chronic disability attributable to mental retardation, cerebral palsy, epilepsy or autism that functional limitations in three or more of the following areas: self-care, receptive manifested before the age of 18. The disability must also result in substantial and expressive language, learning, mobility, self-direction, capacity for independent living, and economic self-sufficiency. Children under the age of 6 years may be eligible for services if there is a strongly demonstrated potential that the child is, or will become developmentally disabled.

Services: A cash assistance program temporarily provides funding and support services to children, individuals and their families. Individuals who are ineligible for cash assistance may be eligible to receive Supportive Services. These may include child care or participation in the Jobs Program. The Family Assistance Program also offers a comprehensive medical and dental program for children in foster care, as well as food stamps. Currently, there are no Colorado City office hours.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Open to Arizona residents who qualify based on income. Eligible parents are pregnant women in their last trimester or have children under the age of 19 who are in their care. Parents of a child who receives Supplemental Security Income (SSI) may also be eligible. For further details on eligibility, see the Web site listed above.

Services: The Rehabilitation Services Administration assists people with disabilities to become or remain economically independent through work, eventually eliminating their need for ongoing governmental support.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Eligible persons must have a disability that is an impediment to employment. This condition can be a physical, psychological or learning disability. Participants must be eligible for full-time employment. Refer potential clients directly to the agency for further assessment of eligibility requirements. Open to Arizona residents only.

Special facilities are available to law enforcement and Child Protective Services to conduct child abuse investigations. Access to medical exams is available. The Children's Justice Center also provides referral services to victims' families. The agency is an accredited Member of the National Children's Alliance.

Services: Community Legal Services (CLS) is a not-for-profit Arizona law firm incorporated in 1952. Services: Defenders of Children is a local organization that provides legal assistance and advocacy with a focus on child abuse. The organization provides free casework and legal assistance on a case-by-case basis, and pursues legislative advocacy to give a voice to children. In addition, resources for therapy are provided for cases that fit prescribed criteria. Community resource referrals, community presentations, and research are provided. Defenders of Children works with child protective services, law enforcement, the District Attorney's Office, and family and criminal justice systems pursuing child safety and the best interests of the child. Defenders of Children also assists with some domestic violence cases when children are at risk of harm. Defenders of Children offers attorney training for volunteer lawyers.

Services: Dixie Care and Share provides food and shelter for homeless or low income individuals. Included in these services are supplementary food boxes, men's and family shelters, laundry facilities, sleeping quarters, showers, clothing and basic personal items. The St. George food bank and pantry office hours are Monday through Friday, 11am – 2pm. The shelter is open 7 days per week beginning at 6pm. Showers are available 7 days per week from 4:00 – 5:30pm. The Hurricane Valley Food Bank and Pantry is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 11am – 2pm.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Free for low-income individuals and families on a temporary or short term basis. Residents of Colorado City are permitted to enter the pantry, but food boxes are available only for residents of Washington County, Utah. For individuals in transit, "camper specials" are available.

Services: The Linkline operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to provide resources to individuals with domestic violence issues. Among those resources are counseling, shelters, safe houses, support groups, police referrals, and mental and physical health services. They also provide referrals to human services agencies, legal services, and victims' assistance groups. The website lists information on protective orders, different types of abuse, and a safety plan. In addition, advocate, counseling and shelter lists are available. The Linkline is provided by the Utah Domestic Violence Council and is one of the State Passages Grant partners.

Services: The Family Support Center Coalition (FSC) has two main locations in the Salt Lake City area and seven additional coalition offices throughout the state, including a location in Cedar City, Utah. Services offered at the main locations include: crisis nursery, parenting classes, grief groups for children and classes for victims of sexual abuse. The crisis nursery is offered at all locations. Counseling/therapy services for children, adults, teens and families are offered at both the Midvale and Sugarhouse locations. The FSC also facilitates polygamy support groups that are available to both current and former polygamist community members.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Crisis Nursery care is available, free of charge, to any parent who needs it. Children under the age of 12 can stay as long as 72 hours if needed. Persons interested in counseling can call either of the main Family Support Center location and talk to a clinician who will determine eligibility. Fees for counseling services, group therapy and parenting classes are charged on Utah's sliding fee scale, taking into consideration the client's income and family size. The FSC also accepts many insurance plans and Medicaid. Services offered to Utah residents who are dependent on Utah-based funding. Services provided to out of state residents who have transferable funding or who are self-pay.

Services: GED orientation and GED preparation classes available at all campus locations, including Colorado City. Mohave County Community College offers free counseling, education and advisement. Mohave Community College offers a Life Skills class (AED 089) which helps students to develop an understanding of the skills necessary to prepare for the work force, such as interview skills, resume preparation, and personal finance skills. Curriculum includes developing interpersonal communication skills and an awareness of everyday law (criminal, civil and traffic). It also addresses goal setting, character development, and ethical and leadership issues. Fundamental applications of business, consumer and construction math, and awareness of the work ethic required for successful career enhancement and employment are also discussed.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: There are four campus locations in Mohave County. MCC serves residents of Mohave County, as well as communities in Nevada and southern Utah. The GED program accepts students age 16 and over, but will sometimes accept younger students. This is a grant-based program and is free for persons dislocated by polygamy.

Services: The purpose of Victim Advocacy is to ensure that victims of crime are treated with fairness and respect by the criminal justice system and to see that their rights are protected. The Victim Advocate offers support, crisis intervention and referrals to local programs and services. The Victim Advocate assists with Orders of Protection and Injunctions against Harassment, and may accompany victims to court hearings and arrange for emergency services. The Victim Advocate also works closely with law enforcement, courts, prosecutors, and social services agencies in Arizona and Utah. The Special Investigator investigates cases of abuse, fraud and other crimes as directed by the County Attorney.



ULS seeks to protect the rights of the disadvantaged and persons of limited means through legal representation, advocacy, and education throughout Utah. Victims who qualify for assistance through ULS may receive up to \$6,000 in legal representation for divorce and custody cases.

Eligibility and Jurisdiction: Low-income Utahns qualify for help depending upon their household income and assets, the type of legal problem and whether that legal problem is within the current list of priority cases. In most cases, income must be at or below 125% of the current federal poverty level for the household's size. A person may also qualify based upon age or the nature of the legal problem without regard to the household's financial circumstances. Overall, there are over 300,000 Utahns who are eligible for legal help from ULS. ULS also has contract attorneys available in Mohave County, Arizona.

The Office of the Arizona Attorney General announced in June 2012 that they would provide the Mohave County Sheriff's Office with \$420,000, funded by a federal grant. These funds will be given to the Sheriff's Office to allow for overtime pay so that Colorado City can be patrolled for 16 hours per day. The hours will be staggered so that the presence of the Sheriff's Office will be felt 24 hours a day.

Although a vote to replace local police within Colorado City with the Mohave County Sheriff's Office was overturned this year, the extra patrols will help to ensure that Colorado City residents have access to law enforcement professionals.

The Arizona Attorney General's Office is thankful to Mohave County Sheriff, Tom Sheahan, and his deputies for taking on the extra hours in order to make sure that all Arizona citizens are kept safe.
